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Spey Bay Wildlife Reserve

Visit Spey Bay and you will find beautiful views across the Moray Firth and up the River Spey, the fastest flowing river in Scotland.



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Marvel at the antics of bottlenose dolphins which come to Spey Bay to feed. The dolphins of the Moray Firth are the largest bottlenose dolphins in the world, reaching almost 4 metres long!

Experience the awesome sight of ospreys diving into the River Spey to catch fish. These amazing birds fly all the way from The Gambia in Africa to raise chicks at Spey Bay!

Walk along the largest vegetated shingle beach in Scotland and see waders, seals, gannets and cormorants.

Stimulate your

senses with a stroll along the River Spey. Smell the wildflowers along the riverbank and listen to swallows, yellowhammers and geese as you walk.



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Admire the amazing array of plant life on the reserve – there are more than 400 species to be found!

Relax with a cup of tea and a homemade cake in Café Wild.

Discover the best places to find wildlife on the reserve. Learn more about the plants and wildlife and get tips on where to see otters, seals, dolphins, salmon and deer.



Search for small blue butterflies, five-spot ladybirds and rhinoceros beetles on the Lein. The Lein used to be an industrial site but is now a thriving home to a huge number of plants and animals.

HOW many birds can you spot? The different habitats of the reserve support over 120 bird species and the Moray Firth is a great place to see wintering migrants such as long-tailed ducks, scoter and pink-footed and greylag geese.





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
