# Be a responsible snorkeller

Check the conditions: be aware of tides, water temperatures, currents and weather forecasts before you leave.

Take a friend: never snorkel alone and always tell people where you are going.

Know who to contact: find out where the nearest medical and/or coastguard facility is and note down who to contact in an emergency.

Know your surroundings: check what the weather and tides are doing, and identify a landmark for reference.

Use the right equipment: only use good quality and well-fitting equipment – mask, snorkel and fins. Wear the right protection: a wetsuit will keep you warm and protect you against jellyfish stings.

If it's sunny, remember to cream up!

#### Follow the Snorkeller's Code:

Do not remove seaweed or animals from the rock or from their homes.

Take care not to kick sealife with fins or stand on delicate animals.

Observe animals where they live and don't take anything away with you.






# Life under



# **Kinghorn Bay**

MAP: OS Explorer 361, NT269866 **NEAREST TOWN:** Kinghorn (0 miles)

Kinghorn Bay is a short walk from Kinghorn's train station. The two advanced zones on opposite sides of the bay are composed of rocky walls and boulder fields, which support a variety of encrusting animals and seaweeds. Look out of scorpion fish and leopard-spotted gobies that hide amongst the rocks. Toilets with accessible access are on site.

Snorkellers here must keep the lifeboat launch area clear, remain vigilant in case of sudden deployment and use a high visibility marker/float.



## Longcraig

MAP: OS Explorer 361, NT279897 **NEAREST TOWN:** Kirkcaldy (2 miles)

Longcraig is a basalt rock that protrudes above


the water's surface and is approximately 200 metres from shore. Beneath the waves you can find swaying kelp and tiny plumose anemones. The rockpools in the shallows are great for beginners. This site can be accessed by the car park on Seafield beach, or by a 10 minute cycle/bus ride from Kirkcaldy.



#### Hoch-ma-toch

MAP: OS Explorer 361, NT274872 **NEAREST TOWN:** Kinghorn (0.5 miles)

Hoch-ma-toch is reached by walking along the Fife Coastal Path from Kinghorn towards Kirkcaldy. The path will lead you to a small pebbled bay, before it climbs and twists on its way to Seafield. A small earthen path leads down to the bay and the water entry point sits at the foot of a rocky extension, on the far end. The earthen path can be located by searching "younger.solo.lends" in what3words.



### **Seafield Tower**

MAP: OS Explorer 361, NT279885 **NEAREST TOWN:** Kirkcaldy (2 miles)

The ruins of Seafield Tower are a 10 minute walk from Seafield beach car park; follow the coastal path towards Kinghorn. Towering kelp provides refuge to a range of juvenile fish species, dahlia anemones and starfish as well as offering a meal to hungry sea urchins. Note that water depth increases markedly beyond the first rocky outcrop, as the coastal shelf slope steepens. This site is part of a protected area and disturbance to harbour and grey seals must be avoided.



## Ravenscraig

MAP: OS Explorer 361, NT294924 **NEAREST TOWN:** Kirkcaldy (1 mile)

Ravenscraig beach is a sheltered beach located on the eastern side of Kirkcaldy. Enter the water beneath the turret, on the far end of the bay. Smoothed sandstone gullies permeate out from the shore offering shelter to shoals of juvenile sand eels. There are two car parks close by and the beach is a 10 minute bus ride from Kirkcaldy. Toilets with accessible access are available.

# The Ecology Centre

Plunge beneath the waves beside the Fife Coastal Path and discover a marine world full of unexpected marvels.

Explore Fife by foot or by fin; the Kingdom is home to one of Scotland's most spectacular coastal footpaths. Running the length of the Fife coast, this footpath sits above a dynamic coast steeped in marine diversity.



The Ecology Centre is an inclusive, community-led charity that enables people of all ages and abilities to experience, learn and benefit from the natural world in a safe and friendly environment. Based on the edge of Kinghorn Loch in Fife, the centre provides volunteer opportunities, outdoor education sessions and a cafe.

The Ecology Centre is a project partner of Restoration Forth, a marine restoration project reviving native seagrass and oyster populations in the Firth of Forth, through community action. The project's long-term goal is to empower local communities to restore 42 hectares of coastal habitat by 2030.
